Supervisor Parsons called the meeting to order at 7:36 p.m. and read the following statement:

I am Supervisor Peter Parsons, and I call to order the Town of Lewisboro Town Board meeting for Monday, May 10, 2020 at 7:36 pm. Before I go any further, I want to confirm that Joel has started recording this meeting. In accordance with the governor's executive order #202.1, this meeting is being conducted via Zoom. That link has been provided to the public so they can view the meeting and we have confirmed that the feed is active and working. I have confirmed with Janet Donohue, our Town Clerk, that the meeting has been duly noticed and legal notice requirements fulfilled. Notice has been placed on the Town of Lewisboro website and included in the email distributions from the Town.

With me on this Zoom conference meeting from the Town of Lewisboro are:

If you want to speak at the public hearing or make a public comment, please raise your hand at the appropriate time. Participants who have raised their hand will show up on the host screen in the order that you raise your hand. The host will then unmute you and tell you that you have the floor. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD I (7:41 – 7:50 p.m.)

GRANT & AMERICAN RESCUE ACT FUNDS & BORROWING

A South Salem resident asked about several grants that were approved, namely the \$150,000 that the town had received to be used for playground and field improvements. What are the time frames for these improvements? She also asked if any money would go to improving the parking lot at Fox Valley and when will the improvements to the Onatru playground begin? And her final question was asking when the town expects to receive the \$1.37 million in American Rescue Act funds (Covid funds) and how they will decide to use these funds. Another resident also stated that the \$1.37 that was discussed has six possible categories to use the money and asked how the town was going to decide how to spend that money.

Mr. Gonçalves asked the resident to email him these questions and he will also touch on a few things during polling of the Board.

ORDINANCES

A Vista resident asked if the Town Board realizes the self-defeating ordinances that are being passed and she gave several examples. She feels that many residents are being given such a hard time and that it is more a "do as I say, not as I do" atmosphere.

PRIDE TASK FORCE

Another resident asked about the pride month task force that Ms. Crimmins put together and she would like to know what the follow-up is on this task force.

POCKET PARK & PRESERVE

A Goldens Bridge Hamlet Organization member questioned the condition that the GBHO needs to be responsible for liability insurance. She stated that in the initial meeting GBHO stated that the group would not be responsible for this other than when they are working on the property.

COMMUNICATIONS (7:51 – 7:54 p.m.)

COMPREHENSIVE/MASTER PLAN STEERING COMMITTEE- Project Launch

Supervisor Parsons stated that the Comprehensive/Master Plan Steering Committee is holding a project launch via Zoom and invited the community to attend on Tuesday, June 8th, at 7:30 p.m. Zoom information will be on the website.

COVID-19 – Update

Supervisor Parsons stated that the Covid figures are improving. Currently Lewisboro has 9 cases, Pound Ridge has 4, Bedford has 14, Somers has 15 and North Salem has 9. The amount of residents that have obtained at least one vaccination is broken down by zip code as follows in Lewisboro: South Salem 48%, Cross River 58%, Waccabuc 60% and Goldens Bridge 67%. <u>TOWN PARK</u> – Update on Nature Trail (8:00 – 8:10 p.m.)

Ms. Crimmins provided an update on the ADA accessible nature trail at the Lewisboro Town Park. Robin (Duff) Price Excavating did win the bid with a price of \$63,000. Mr. Price hopes to start work next week and hopes to have part of the trail completed by the start of camp. Kye Viall will also start his Eagle Scout project. Ms. Crimmins stated that the funding for this project is coming from a State Aid to Municipalities Grant from State Senator Peter Harckham's office referred to as the SAM grant. Ms. Crimmins stated that she received a total of \$70,000 for the ADA trail and the rest of the money is going to the Parks & Recreation department for the Fox Valley upgrades, not the paving. Part of the \$7,000 will be going towards the retaining wall at the Lewisboro Baseball Association fields as part of the Town Park project. Ms. Crimmins explained that this is a reimbursement grant. The total SAM grant was \$150,000. The project was delayed due to Covid.

<u>TOWN PARK</u> – Lewisboro Playground Improvement Project

Ms. Crimmins urged residents to visit the website for the Lewisboro Playground Improvement Project; <u>www.lewisboroplayground.com</u>. This is a 501©3 group that was started by local families. She stated that none of the money from the SAM grant would be directed to this project.

<u>LGBTQIA+ PRIDE MONTH</u> – Update & Request to Fundraise at Onatru Park (8:10 – 8:33 p.m.)

Ms. Crimmins introduced Rachel Simon, who is the coordinator of the Pride Month Task Force. Ms. Simon discussed the events that will take place on Saturday, June 26, 2021 (rain date is June 27) with the following events: 2 p.m. Drag Queen Story Hour, 3 p.m. Pet Pride Parade, 3:30 p.m. Progress Pride Flag Raising Ceremony, 4-6 p.m. Pride Picnic Food Truck Festival and at 6 p.m. Queer-Larious, a comedy showcase. Other local organizational groups will be there as well. Fundraising will also take place at this event that will help pay for the comedians and to support two local LGBTQIA+ organizations - The Loft and Pride Works for Youth.

John Jay High School will also be coordinating a week of pride events which will take place the second week of June. There will also be an educational event hosted on Zoom.

Jules Zuckerberg, a John Jay graduate, and author will also be at the event.

Ms. Crimmins also went over the budget for the events. Ten flags were purchased for \$147, a Recreation Assistant was hired for \$235 for parking and logistics at Onatru, 7-8 banners were \$226. This left the committee with \$392. The comedians will cost \$750 and the drag queen story hour will cost \$300, which Ms. Crimmins stated she will fund. Ms. Crimmins did invite anyone with ideas or were interested in funding anything to reach out to her.

Ms. Crimmins and Ms. Simon would like permission to fundraise at Onatru Park.

SALT DOME – Hickory Homes (9:03 – 9:28 p.m.)

Supervisor Parsons read the following letter from the Wallace Family who has ownded Farvue Farm for many years:

Subject: Commercial portable timber processing plant; Commercial portable 2 phase rock processing plant at the Salt Dome site

Dear Mr. Parsons and Councilmembers,

Our Wallace Family has owned Farvue Farm since 1946, and as the current owners we are grateful for the work that you do on behalf of South Salem.

We're writing today because we've become increasingly aware, thanks to Carol Cernak and others, of the escalating activity near the Salt Dome site by Hickory Homes. Our visit last week to the edges of the operation and the South Salem Cemetery reinforced our concern about the magnitude of what has been allowed to take place in this critical part of South Salem.

The heightened noise, traffic and air particulates from this operation have steadily been diminishing the quality of life for a number of South Salem residents. The scale of the operation there would seem to have become inconsistent with necessary environmental protection for the adjoining wetlands and surrounding properties.

It will be particularly dismaying for visitors to the Cemetery to witness how the operation has relentlessly encroached to the very edges where loved ones are buried.

We would hope that the Town could look more deeply into whether the scale of the operation continues to be consistent with local, State and Federal regulations.

We know you are dealing with many thorny issues, and we are grateful for your increased consideration of this one.

Mr. Gonçalves stated that after several meetings with neighbors of the salt dome, the Highway Department, the wetlands consultant, the owner of Hickory Homes, an owner of a grave at the South Salem Cemetery and Town Board members, it was decided to terminate the existing

agreement with Hickory Homes. Mr. Gonçalves stated that they will assess the Highway Department's needs for removal of materials that are currently being collected at the salt dome and develop a plan for the mulching operation and put this out to bid.

Supervisor Parsons stated he is a bit concerned about getting the cart before the horse. Highway owns very little space, and this is one of them and they need to get rid of drain material and dead trees and trees that have been taken out by a storm. Mr. Gonçalves stated that mulching would still be done, but it would be done as an example 4 times a year. The town would take care of the town's needs, but not turn it into a materials operations plant, which it has become.

Supervisor Parsons stated he would like to see the shoring up by the cemetery take place and Mr. Gonçalves stated that is already being worked on.

Mr. Sklarin stated that he would reach out to Highway and see where they are and look at future agreements.

Mr. Welsh feels that we should have something in place before we end the agreement with Hickory Homes.

Highway Superintendent Peter Ripperger gave a history of the town's agreement with Hickory Homes. He stated that every year, department heads are asked to keep their budgets low and come up with creative ways to save the town money. Mr. Ripperger stated he spends about \$25,000 every other year to get rid of town wood and waste. He stated that the town had accumulated about 4,500 cubic yards of debris over about 7 years and Hickory Homes would recycle and remove the wood and this saved the town approximately \$90,000. But Hickory Homes also wanted to bring in their own trees. Hickory Homes has saved the town approximately \$120,000. If Hickory moves out, bids will have to be done every 2 years, especially with the number of dead trees in the area. Most of their equipment has been removed. Mr. Ripperger stated that other towns do this as well such as Bedford and North Castle. Pound Ridge uses Hickory Homes as well. Mr. Ripperger feels that this was done up front. If the agreement is ended, Mr. Ripperger stated that a 60 days' notice is required, however Mr. Gonçalves stated that the agreement stating 60 days was not signed.

Mr. Sklarin will meet with Mr. Ripperger to see how to move forward with this and they will report back to the Board.

SALT DOME

A resident stated that most of the work being done at the salt dome is not being done by town trucks. She feels that someone is getting a kickback of sorts. She feels that the work that is being done is not legal.

NATIONAL POLICE WEEK

A few residents reminded the public that this week is "Police Week" and thanked Chief Alfano and his entire department for all that they do for the town. A gathering will be held outside of the police station on Wednesday, May 12 at 6 p.m. to show support.

EMERGENCY SERVICES & APEX

A resident thanked our local emergency services and Apex Fitness for supporting the John Jay Football team at the Championship game with a parade. The sense of community that was witnessed again was incredible. She also feels that there should be no question about giving pool and tennis passes to the first responders who put their lives on the line for us.
