Dear Supervisor Parsons and Members of the Town Board:

I write on behalf of the Planning Board of the Town of Lewisboro (the "Planning Board") concerning the above-referenced project and the "Monroe" analysis being undertaken by the Town Board. The Planning Board discussed this matter at its June 19, 2018 meeting, and submits the following comments for the Town Board's consideration.

The Planning Board stands ready to assist the Town Board, and lend the benefits of its past experience reviewing wireless telecommunication facilities, should this project be deemed exempt from local zoning regulations.

The Planning Board further asks the Town Board to consider the following points with regard to the proposed facility:

- Has the Katonah Lewisboro School District ("KLSD") definitively advised the Town of Lewisboro and/or the project proponent that wireless facilities cannot be placed on KLSD grounds in Cross River?
- Will the proposed facility on the LVAC premises in Cross River provide wireless coverage at or in the environs of the intersection of Routes 138 and 121?

• Proper consideration must be given to the impact of the proposed facility upon the historic and "Town gateway" attributes of the Cross River location.

Again, the Planning Board is prepared to provide further input and assistance in the event the Town Board, upon an application of the "Monroe" test, determines this project is immune from zoning requirements.

On behalf of the Planning Board, I thank the Town Board for consideration of these points.

TOWN OF LEWISBORO

LOCAL LAW NUMBER -2018 OF THE TOWN OF LEWISBORO

AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER 220, SECTIONS 220-23(A)(20) and 220-43.6 OF THE LEWISBORO TOWN CODE

BE IT ENACTED by the Town Board of the Town of Lewisboro, Westchester County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 220, Section 220-23(A), entitled "Schedule of regulations for residential districts" is hereby amended to add subsection (20) to read as follows:

§ 220-23. Schedule of regulations for residential districts.

- A. Permitted principal uses in R-4A, R-2A, R-1A, R-1/2A and R-1/4A Districts are as follows:
 - (20) *Dog training and exercising.

Section 2. Chapter 220, Section 220-43.6 entitled "Dog training and exercising" is hereby enacted to read as follows:

§ 220-43.6. Dog training and exercising.

Dog training and exercising shall be special uses as follows:

- A. Location. The special use listed in this section may be permitted in a residence district only in locations fronting on or having direct access to major or collector roads as determined by the Planning Board.
- B. Minimum Lot Area. The minimum lot area required shall be not less than fifty(50) acres.
- C. Setbacks. Such use shall be set back at least fifty (50) feet from the property lines, or at such increased distance as determined by the Planning Board.
- D. Buffer area. A landscaped buffer area, meeting at least the minimum requirements of §220-15 of this chapter, shall be required along all lot lines adjoining

properties in residence districts, except where determined by the approving agency
that a lesser width or no buffer will meet the purpose of this requirement, such as
if natural buffers already exist.

- E. Fencing. Fencing shall be erected in a manner that contains the dogs within the lot.
- F. Number of dogs. Not more than one (1) dog per acre of land shall be trained or exercised on the property at any one time. Not more than eight (8) dogs shall be trained or exercised by a single handler at any one time.
- G. Limitation. Dogs shall not be caged, boarded, kenneled, tethered or kept overnight on the property.
- H. Waste. Dog waste shall be picked up daily and removed from the property for proper disposal.
- Leash. Any dog not capable of being controlled and restrained by the handler's voice commands shall remain on a leash at all times.
- J. Barking. Habitually barking dogs shall not be allowed to be trained or exercised on the property.
- K. Other requirements. Such use shall comply with any other requirements of this chapter and any special requirements deemed appropriate by the approving agency in accordance with the requirements of §220-32 herein.

Section 3. If any provision of this Local Law is declared illegal, unconstitutional or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Local Law shall be declared to have been separately adopted and shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 4. This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York.

- I am following up on the December 2017 letter (attached) that we sent to the Lewisboro Zoning Board in regard to the application for Active Dog to take ownership of a property on Smith Ridge Road, to be managed as a private dog run/training facility. Westchester Land Trust owns an adjacent property, known as the Schuberthan Preserve, which we manage as a nature preserve. This preserve does not currently have a trail, but it may in the future, and WLT regularly sends staff to all of our preserves to monitor and maintain them. We are sending this follow-up because the situation with Active Dog has worsened since we wrote the 2017 letter, and we felt you should be aware of it.
- Active Dog had been sending and continues to send their employees (dog walkers) to, among other locations, the Westchester Wilderness Walk/Zofnass Family Preserve, which is located on Upper Shad Road in Pound Ridge. This 125 acre preserve, with 7 miles of trails, is owned and managed by Westchester Land Trust, for the enjoyment of the public. The preserve regulations (including dogs needing to be leashed at all times) are clearly posted at the entrance to the preserve. Nevertheless, Active Dog employees routinely walk multiple dogs offleash on the preserve trails (5 dogs in a group appear to be common). Their business model is made clear on their website—specifically that "packs" (their word choice) of dogs will be allowed to run off leash by Active Dog employees on preserves and parks in the area. They post videos of these outings daily on their website so the owners can see how much "fun" the dogs are having. The dogs do not stay on the trails, they routinely urinate and defecate throughout the preserves, and they trample vegetation, which in many cases, is being purposefully managed by the organizations that care for these properties.

It is unfortunate that Active Dog seems to give no consideration to the fact that they are on private property, with leash regulations, and that <u>all</u> visitors deserve the ability to walk peacefully on a trail without the fear of being rushed, jumped on, or worse, by strange dogs. We have been notified of several cases where dogs or people have been accosted, and in some cases bitten, by off-leash dogs under the supervision of Active Dog. In the cases where our staff was on-site, we have spoken to them to remind them of WLT's posted leash policy. Their employees have routinely refused to obey our preserve regulations, and responded disrespectfully to WLT staff. In some instances WLT staff has been accosted by off-leash dogs from Active Dog running up the trail. WLT staff has fortunately not been injured to date, but other dogs and visitors have been. The Active Dog organization has shown complete disregard for our rules while on our private property, and disrespect to other visitors to our preserves.

• Since the 2017 letter, the situation with Active Dog has worsened, and we were notified yesterday of another instance (which happened in March 2018) where an off-leash dog under Active Dog's care, got into a fight with another visitor's dog, that was also off leash. When the owner of the other dog tried to intervene, she was bitten by the Active Dog animal. This owner reported the incident to the Pound Ridge police.

- Active Dog is apparently well known to the Pound Ridge Police and the Pound Ridge Animal Control Officer. I suggest that you may wish to speak with them for additional information about their experience with the organization, and the complaints against them.
- We are aware that Pound Ridge Land Conservancy is facing similar issues with Active Dog on some of their preserves.
- We acknowledge that other visitors to WWW/ZFP (unaffiliated with Active Dog) also run their dogs off leash, and off trail, in violation of our policy. When we witness this, we give them the same warning.
- WLT will be sending notice to Active Dog that they will now be completely banned from the WWW/ZFP preserve, as well as any of the other 28 WLT preserves that we own throughout Westchester and Putnam Counties, including the Schuberthan Preserve in Lewisboro. If their employees are found to be on any of our properties, we intend to follow through with a trespass complaint against them.
- Given the experiences we and others have had with the Active Dog company and its employees, Westchester Land Trust now must unfortunately take a stronger stance about the proposal for the Smith Ridge Road property being used for a dog run/training facility by Active Dog. We were already concerned about a great number of dogs trampling the sensitive wetlands and interfering with the natural flora and fauna of the Smith Ridge open space corridor (which buffers the Norwalk water supply lands to the southeast of the property). We now have an even greater concern relating to public safety.
 - o At the very least, Active Dog should be required to install and maintain a secure fence around the entire perimeter of the property to protect all neighboring property owners from the potential danger that their off-leash dogs present.
 - o The dogs should be permanently fenced out of the wetlands portion of the property.
 - Any proposed creation of a trail system on the property to be used by the public is, in our view, illadvised, given the public safety issues that we, and others have already encountered on our own properties that Active Dog has used.

I am writing in regards to the application submitted to the Zoning Board of Appeals on behalf Active Dog LLC. (Cal. No. 32-17-SP) that is currently under your review.

Westchester Land Trust (WLT) owns parcel 50.A-9848-11 which directly abuts the property proposed for a dog walking, hiking and training facility. WLT manages this property - The Schuberthan Preserve - as a nature preserve and we are concerned that if the training facility is permitted, unleashed dogs may routinely enter The Schuberthan Preserve and cause degradation to its forest and sensitive wetlands.

Active Dog Company is known to hike their dogs off leash on nature preserves. The Active Dog website features dozens of photographs and videos of dogs off leash and off trail in the woods. Many local preserves, including ours, have posted leash policies. Once off leash, dogs roam wherever they choose, which can cause disturbance to wildlife and wetlands. Worse, unleashed dogs can interfere with the visitor experience at a preserve. Worse still, unleashed dogs are more likely than leashed dogs to harass and/or attack people and other pets.

Westchester Land Trust asks that the Zoning Board of Appeals consider how unleashed dogs may impact neighboring properties and take steps to buffer neighbors from these possible disturbances. Perhaps the Board can establish setback requirements along the parcel boundaries where dog activities will be prohibited.

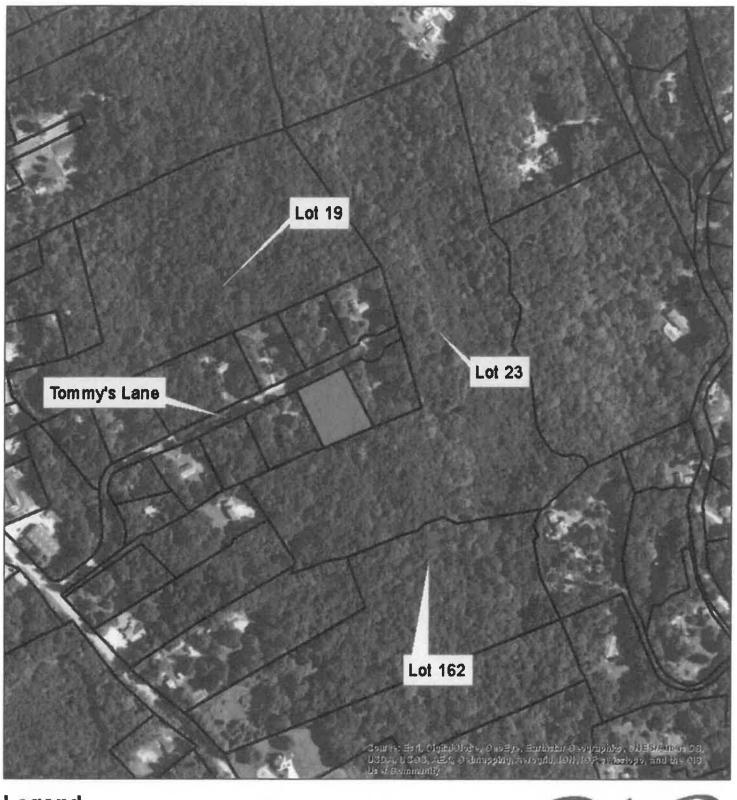
iclosed: Map of the Schuberthan Preserve in the context of Cal No. 32-17-SP

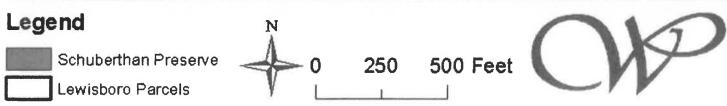

AGREEMENT made this day of , 201 by and between:

Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601 (hereinafter the "County")

and

THE TOWN OF LEWISBORO, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having its offices and principal place of business at P.O. Box 500, 11 Main Street, South Salem, New York 10590 (hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Town"), acting by and through its Police Department (the "Town Police Department")

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, on or about November 1, 2017 the County entered into an agreement with the New York State Office for the Prevention of Domestic Violence to accept a grant in the amount of \$200,000.00 (the "Grant Agreement") to conduct a Risk Reduction Enhanced Response Pilot Program to prevent intimate partner related homicide in the northeast corner of Westchester County (the "Program"); and

WHEREAS, the goals of the Program are to reduce the risk of intimate partner violence and homicides, increase safety of victims while holding abusers more accountable, reduce recidivism, provide enhanced training and identify gaps in current practices; and

WHEREAS, the Program seeks to utilize a team approach by bringing together local multi-disciplinary Program partners who will share case information and implement case-specific intervention plans to mitigate danger; and

WHEREAS, the team, known as the Northern Westchester Risk Reduction Team ("NWRRT"), includes the following partners: Hope's Door, Inc.; Pace University; Urban Resource Institute; Biofeedback Resources International Corporation; as well as local law enforcement agencies from towns located in the northeast corner of Westchester County; and

WHEREAS, the Town, through the Town Police Department, desires to participate in the Program as a member of the NWRRT.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises hereinafter set forth, the parties hereto agree as follows:

FIRST: The above recitals are hereby incorporated into and made a part of this Agreement.

SECOND: The Town, through the Town Police Department, shall participate in the Program as a member of the NWRRT and shall provide the services described in Schedule "A", attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Work").

THIRD: As a material element of this Agreement, the Town shall abide by all terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement and the Grant Agreement. The Town acknowledges that it has received an exact copy of the Grant Agreement, has read it and is familiar with all its terms and conditions.

FOURTH: The Town shall contribute an in-kind match of \$10,000 for the use of dedicated space at a facility to conduct the Program.

<u>FIFTH</u>: This Agreement shall commence retroactive to October 1, 2017 and shall continue through September 30, 2019, except as may be sooner terminated as hereinafter set forth.

<u>SIXTH</u>: The Town agrees to procure and maintain insurance naming the County as additional insured, as provided and described in Schedule "B", entitled "Standard Insurance Provisions", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof. In addition to, and not in limitation of the insurance provisions contained in Schedule "B", the Town agrees:

(a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the negligence of the County, the Town shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees, agents and elected officials from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out

of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Town or third parties under the direction or control of the Town; and

(b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto.

The provisions of this paragraph shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

SEVENTH: Any purported delegation of duties or assignment of rights under this Agreement without the prior express written consent of the other party is void.

EIGHTH: (a) The County, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Town, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when the County deems it to be in its best interest. Upon receipt of notice that the County is terminating this Agreement in its best interests, the Town shall stop work immediately and incur no further costs in furtherance of this Agreement without the express approval of the Director, and the Town shall direct any approved subcontractors to do the same.

(b) In the event the County determines that there has been a material breach by the Town of any of the terms of the Agreement and such breach remains uncured for forty-eight (48) hours after service on the Town of written notice thereof, the County, in addition to any other right or remedy it might have, may terminate this Agreement and the County shall have the right, power and authority to complete the Work provided for in this Agreement, or contract for its completion, and any additional expense or cost of such completion shall be charged to and paid by the Town. Without limiting the foregoing, upon written notice to the Town, repeated breaches by the Town of duties or obligations under this Agreement shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement justifying termination for cause hereunder without requirement for further opportunity to cure.

NINTH: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or delivered by hand or overnight courier, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notice sent by

registered or certified mail postage pre-paid), as set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt. Notices shall be sent to the following:

TENTH: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York and any dispute will be heard in a court of competent jurisdiction of the State of New York located in Westchester County.

ELEVENTH: This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by the parties and approved by the Office of the Westchester County Attorney

TWELFTH: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

SCHEDULE "A" SCOPE OF WORK

The Town Police Department, as a member of the Northern Westchester Risk Reduction Team ("NWRRT"), shall provide the following services:

- Train its police officers on intimate partner related violence
- Attend cross trainings with other law enforcement agencies
- Serve as the initial connection with victims
- Conduct lethality assessments
- Provide an enhanced response to the team by referring high risk cases
- Conduct home visits when needed
- Ensure offender accountability through making arrests when appropriate

SCHEDULE "B" STANDARD INSURANCE PROVISIONS (Town)

1. Prior to commencing work, the Town shall obtain at its own cost and expense the required insurance from insurance companies licensed in the State of New York, carrying a Best's financial rating of A or better, and shall provide evidence of such insurance to the County of Westchester (the "County"), as may be required and approved by the Director of Risk Management of the County. The policies or certificates thereof shall provide that thirty days prior to cancellation or material change in the policy, notices of same shall be given to the Director of Risk Management of the County of Westchester by registered mail, return receipt requested, for all of the following stated insurance policies. All notices shall name the Town and identify the Agreement.

If at any time any of the policies required herein shall be or become unsatisfactory to the County, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing any such policy shall be or become unsatisfactory to the County, the Town shall upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, submit the same to the Department of Risk Management of the County of Westchester for approval and submit a certificate thereof. Upon failure of the Town to furnish, deliver and maintain such insurance, the Agreement, at the election of the County, may be declared suspended, discontinued or terminated. Failure of the Town to take out, maintain, or the taking out or maintenance of any required insurance, shall not relieve the Town from any liability under the Agreement, nor shall the insurance requirements be construed to conflict with or otherwise limit the contractual obligations of the Town concerning indemnification. All property losses shall be made payable to and adjusted with the County.

In the event that claims, for which the County may be liable, in excess of the insured amounts provided herein are filed by reason of any operations under the Agreement, the amount of excess of such claims or any portion thereof, may be withheld from payment due or to become due the Town until such time as the Town shall furnish such additional security covering such claims in form satisfactory to the County of Westchester.

- 2. The Town shall provide proof of the following coverage (if additional coverage is required for a specific agreement, those requirements will be described in the "Special Conditions" of the contract specifications):
- (a) Workers' Compensation. Certificate form C-105.2 (9/07) or State Fund Insurance Company form U-26.3 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Workers' Compensation Law. State Workers' Compensation Board form DB-120.1 is required for proof of compliance with the New York State Disability Benefits Law. Location of operation shall be "All locations in Westchester County, New York."

Where an applicant claims to not be required to carry either a Workers' Compensation Policy or Disability Benefits' Policy, or both, the employer must complete affidavit form WC/DB-100 (revised 9/07), sign and notarize the form, and send to the NYS Workers'

Compensation Board for (stamped) approval. The stamped approval (valid for 1 year) should then be provided to the County of Westchester with all other insurance documentation.

If the employer is self-insured for Worker's Compensation, he/she should present a certificate from the New York State Worker's Compensation Board evidencing that fact (Either SI-12, Certificate of Workers' Compensation Self-Insurance, or GSI-105.2, Certificate of Participation in Workers' Compensation Group Self-Insurance).

- (b) Employer's Liability with minimum limit of \$100,000.
- (c) Commercial General Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and \$100,000 for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 (c.s.1), naming the County of Westchester as an additional insured. This insurance shall include the following coverages:
 - (i) Premises Operations.
 - (ii) Broad Form Contractual.
 - (iii) Independent Town and Sub-Town.
 - (iv) Products and Completed Operations.

All Contracts involving the use of explosives and demolition shall provide the above coverage with elimination of the XCU exclusion from the policy, or proof that XCU is covered.

- (d) Automobile Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of liability per occurrence of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and a minimum limit of \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage or a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 unless otherwise indicated in the contract specifications. This insurance shall include for bodily injury and property damage the following coverages:
 - (i) Owned automobiles.
 - (ii) Hired automobiles.
 - (iii) Non-owned automobiles.
 - 3. All policies of the Town shall be endorsed to contain the following clauses:
- (a) Insurers shall have no right to recovery or subrogation against the County of Westchester (including its employees and other agents and agencies), it being the intention of the parties that the insurance policies so effected shall protect both parties and be primary coverage for any and all losses covered by the above-described insurance.
- (b) The clause "other insurance provisions" in a policy in which the County of Westchester is named as an insured, shall not apply to the County of Westchester.
- (c) The insurance companies issuing the policy or policies shall have no recourse against the County of Westchester (including its agents and agencies as aforesaid) for payment of any premiums or for assessments under any form of policy.
- (d) Any and all deductibles in the above described insurance policies shall be assumed by and be for the account of, and at the sole risk of, the Town.

LOCAL LAW NUMBER -2018 OF THE TOWN OF LEWISBORO

ENACTMENT OF CHAPTER 181 OF THE LEWISBORO TOWN CODE

BE IT ENACTED by the Town Board of the Town of Lewisboro, Westchester County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 181, entitled "Retail Checkout Bags and EPS (Styrofoam)," is hereby enacted to read as follows:

Chapter 181

RETAIL CHECKOUT BAGS AND EPS (STYROFOAM)

§181-1. Purpose.

§181-2. Justification.

§181-3. Definitions.

§181-4. Restriction on checkout bags.

§181-5. Effective Date.

§181-6. Penalties for offenses.

§181-1. Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to improve the environment in the Town of Lewisboro (the "Town") and to protect the health, safety and general welfare of its residents by encouraging the use of reusable cloth or heavy plastic bags and banning single-use plastic bags for retail checkout of purchased goods. Retail establishments are encouraged to make cloth reusable bags available for sale and to encourage shoppers to bring their own reusable bags. In furtherance of the

aforementioned purpose, it is also the intention of this chapter to prohibit the use of styrofoam containers and styrofoam cups by delis, food stores, food establishments and restaurants.

§181-2. Justification.

Non-biodegradable plastic bags are often discarded into the environment. Only a portion of them are deposited into landfills, while the remaining portion contributes to the pollution of our waterways, clogs sewers, endangers wildlife, and becomes litter which negatively impacts the natural beauty of the Town. Further, small plastic particles which have a toxic chemical composition are consumed by fish, which are then consumed by humans, which has been shown to be harmful to human health. Studies show that styrofoam containers are a contributing factor to cancer in humans as toxic chemicals from such containers leech into the food and drink contained therein.

§181-3. Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

CHECKOUT BAG – A carryout bag that is provided to a customer at the point of sale. The term "checkout bag" does not include plastic produce bags or plastic bags measuring 28 inches by 36 inches or larger in size.

PLASTIC PRODUCE BAG – A flexible container bag made of very thin plastic material with a single opening used to transport produce, meats or other items selected by customers to carry said items to the point of sale.

RECYCLABLE PAPER BAG – A standard 12"x17"x7" paper grocery bag, with or without handles, that i) contains no old growth fiber, ii) is 100% recyclable, iii) contains a minimum of 40% post-consumer recycled content, and iv) displays the words "recyclable" on the exterior of the bag.

RETAIL SALES – The transfer to a customer of goods in exchange for payment occurring in

retail stores, sidewalk sales, farmer's markets, flea markets, tag sales, sales by residents at their homes and sales by non-profit organizations.

RETAILER – Any person or entity engaged in retail sales.

REUSABLE BAG – A bag with handles made of cloth or other fabric and/or made of durable plastic that is at least 2.25 mils thick.

STYROFOAM – Any type of expanded polystyrene foam ("EPS") material.

§181-4. Restriction on checkout bags.

Retailers shall only provide reusable bags and recyclable paper bags as checkout bags to customers. Retailers shall charge customers a fee of not less than \$0.15 for each paper bag. All fees collected by a retailer under this chapter shall be retained by the retailer. Nothing in this section shall prohibit retailers from making reusable cloth bags available for sale to customers at a price determined by the retailer. Plastic produce bags, newspaper plastic bags and dry cleaner plastic bags shall not be considered checkout bags for the purposes of this chapter and shall be exempt from the provisions of this chapter.

§181-5. Effective Date.

This chapter shall become effective on January 1, 2019. This provision is intended to provide retail establishments with the ability to dispose of their existing inventory of plastic checkout bags and/or styrofoam containers and cups.

§181-6. Penalties for offenses.

Any person or entity who violates the provisions of this chapter shall be guilty of a violation, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$250 for conviction of a first offense; for conviction of a second offense, both of which were committed within a period of five years, punishable by a fine not less than \$500 nor more than \$700; and upon conviction for a third or subsequent offense, all

of which were committed within a period of five years, punishable by a fine not less than \$700 nor more than \$1,000. However, for the purposes of conferring jurisdiction upon courts and judicial officers generally, violations of this chapter shall be deemed misdemeanors, and for such purpose only, all provisions of law relating to misdemeanors shall apply to such violations, but the charge itself shall be a violation level offense as a violation of the Town Code. Each day's continued violation shall constitute a separate additional violation as may be cited.

§181-7. Certain styrofoam items exempt.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this chapter, the following containers, cups and articles shall be exempt from the prohibition provided in this chapter:

- A. Styrofoam containers used for prepackaged food filled and sealed prior to receipt by the store.
- B. Single service articles consisting of styrofoam sold in food stores off the shelf that do not contain any food or beverages in them.
- C. Styrofoam containers used to store raw meat, pork, fish, seafood or poultry sold from a butcher case or similar retail appliance.

Section 2. If any provision of this Local Law is declared illegal, unconstitutional or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Local Law shall be declared to have been separately adopted and shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 3. This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York.
