FOREWORD

The rural character of Lewisboro has well withstood the pressures of development through the last century. And although it has, like the rest of upper Westchester County, shifted from farmland to a residential community, it is still home to much of the native fauna and flora that lived here centuries ago. Bobcats, foxes, and mink still roam our forests, otters still swim the waterways, copperheads bask in the sun on remote rocky ledges, and orchids bloom in pristine wetlands. Many rare species, some of which are endangered or threatened on a statewide level, still find refuge in the wilder reaches of our town.

The rich diversity of wildlife in Lewisboro is due to its varied landscape and a correspondingly rich diversity of natural habitats. The bedrock geology and soils, the forest types, the abundant and varied wetlands, lakes, and streams, and even the manmade fields and stone walls all contribute to the overall biodiversity we see today.

The soils in Lewisboro are underlain by at least six different types of bedrock, mostly schists and gneisses. But during the last ice age, the glaciers ground through these bedrocks in several areas to expose an underlying limestone, Inwood Marble. The resulting "marble valleys" produce calcium-rich soils and groundwater to create habitat for calcium-dependent plants and animals. The wetlands in these marble valleys historically supported the now federally threatened Bog Turtle, which has apparently been extirpated in Lewisboro since the 1960's. All four of the natural lakes that occur in Lewisboro (Kitchawan, Waccabuc, Oscaleta, and Rippowam) are situated in the marble valleys and thus support a broad diversity of native aquatic plants, such as the rare Angled Spikerush. The marble underlying these lakes also chemically buffers the waters, thus making them immune to the effects of acid rain.

The forests in Lewisboro are among the most beautiful in the world. Known to ecologists as "mixed mesophytic forests", they are unique in their absence of any single dominant tree species. Instead, they are characterized by a fairly even mixture of oaks, maples, hickories, birches, and others. This makes our autumns more colorful than most other places and, since so many insects tend to focus on certain tree species, it also increases biodiversity. Although most of our forests are "second-growth", having grown back in areas that were formerly cleared for agriculture, there are some that are quite old, perhaps having been used as woodlots (for fuel and lumber) but never completely cleared. In these older forests, there are trees several hundred years old, and the woodland wildflowers that grow in their shade include many rare and unusual species which seldom occur in the younger second-growth forests.

Lewisboro also has a great variety of wetlands and lakes. As mentioned above, Lakes Waccabuc, Oscaleta, Rippowam, and Kitchawan are ancient glacial lakes that support a high diversity of native wildlife. The peripheral wetlands associated with these four lakes are among the most biologically rich habitats in Westchester County. Manmade lakes, such as Lakes Katonah and Truesdale, though usually less diverse in native aquatic plant and animal species, provide valuable refuge for wildlife, especially

migrating water birds. Vernal pools, which are small, seasonal, forest ponds critical to the survival of certain frogs and salamanders, are fairly common in our forests and still maintain healthy populations of amphibians, including the regionally rare Jefferson's Salamander.

Even the relics of our earlier farming days continue to provide habitat diversity for Lewisboro. Many of the meadows that were once pasture for livestock remain in various stages of succession. Those that are maintained by frequent mowing provide open habitat for Bluebirds and Killdeer. The abandoned fields, as they become invaded with weeds and shrubs, provide a coarser habitat for Meadowlarks and Indigo Buntings. Red Fox and Blacksnakes are still common in these fields. The endless miles of stone walls that crisscross the town provide refuge and foraging corridors for snakes, mice, and weasels.

In recent years, it has been shown that healthy ecosystems, including the water we drink and the air we breathe, are dependent on high levels of native biodiversity in our immediate surroundings. This is a quality-of-life issue that affects everybody. It is fortunate for us that Lewisboro has retained so much of its original biodiversity, and it is gratifying to see efforts such as this to preserve what we have. The Lewisboro Conservation Advisory Council, by creating this open-space inventory, has taken a major step toward ensuring an environmentally healthy future for our town.

Open Space Inventory Methodology

The Lewsiboro Conservation Advisory Council began writing the Open Space Inventory in early 1999 at the direction of the Lewisboro Planning Board. This Inventory is part of the Comprehensive Plan update, undertaken at the request of the Lewisboro Town Board.

Education:

The CAC met with experts in the field of planning; the Westchester Land Trust, Lewisboro's Planning Consultant Will Agresta, Westchester County's Environmental Management Council. Several members attended the Community Leadership Alliance Program. The CAC also met with experts in the field of land use law from Columbia University and Pace University. Lewisboro's 1973 and 1985 Master Plans and the 1973 Open Space List were reviewed. The CAC also had several work sessions with the Planning Board.

Many local naturalists were consulted: Ken Soltesz, Curator at Cranberry Lake Preserve, on locally rare plants and wildlife; Beth Herr, curator at Ward Pound Ridge, on local habitat types; Jay Fain on wetland characteristics; the Wildlife Conservation Society's Metropolitan Conservation Alliance on reptiles and amphibians; John Askildsen, Bedford Audubon, on birds.

Mapping:

Vegetative maps were made by assembling Westchester County Department of Planning 1995 aerial maps into a composite. This showed the town's undeveloped, unfragmented areas. A clear mylar was made of the town's zoning map, highlighting large lots (over twenty acres). By overlaying the zoning mylar on top of the vegetative map, large unfragmented parcels were identified. Tax records were used to determine whether these parcels were preserved or still developable. The zoning mylar was then updated to show those large, unfragmented parcels that were preserved and those that were still developable. Trails were then overlayed, using the 1980 Town Trail Map, the Lewisboro Horsemens' Association trail map, and the trails found in the "Walking Wild Lewisboro" trail book. Streams and wetlands, prioritized in the 1973 Open Space list and the 1985 Master Plan as "Key Natural Areas" were overlayed. Finally, USGS bedrock maps were overlayed to show aquifers (drinking water) and limestone wetlands (herptile habitat).

With the overlays complete, patterns of undeveloped, unfragmented natural areas connected to existing preserves became apparent. Given the emphasis that planners, naturalists and Lewisboro's Master Plans put on preserving greenways, the CAC outlined five large greenways for preservation and mapped them.

Fieldwork:

Twenty wildlife studies done in Lewisboro were reviewed. Most were done as part of Environmental Impact Statements for subdivisions, found in the Planning Board files. Species observed were cross-referenced with the protected species lists from Westchester County and New York State Department of Conservation. A total of thirty-four protected species were observed in town. The habitats these species were found in were noted and listed.

The thirty-plus developable parcels located in greenways were walked, photographed and classified. The following natural resources were noted: streams, wetlands, fields-meadows, steep slopes, scenic vistas, ridgelines, rare plants, mature trees, landmarks, connections to other preserves, wildlife habitat, trails and other passive recreation opportunities. These resources have been identified as being significant to Lewisboro's citizens in surveys, forums, town meetings and Master Plans.

Unprotected parcels over twenty acres that are isolated by development were not walked, but were listed.

Quantification of Existing Open Space:

Existing open space was classified by type: county park, town park, reservoir land, water, nature preserves, schools, and private recreation. Total open space was then compared to other towns and the county average. Lewisboro's open space percentage is below the level of neighboring towns and the county average. The rate of change in open space was then compared to the rate of development of vacant land. Since 1984, less than one percent of Lewisboro's acreage has been preserved as open space.

Public Comment:

Copies of the Open Space Inventory book and maps were presented to the Planning Board and the Town Board in early 2000. A display of the Inventory, with photographs, charts and maps, was open to the public for eight weeks at Onatru Farm. Maps of the Inventory were also displayed at town fairs in October 1999 and May 2000. The local newspaper featured numerous articles about these exhibits throughout 1999 and 2000.

Future Studies:

In early 2000, the Town Board and Planning Board authorized the CAC to complete the Open Space Plan, prioritizing parcels for preservation and determining effective means to preserve those parcels.

Lewisboro Greenways

The CAC has identified five greenways that cover 2,700 acres or 15% of Lewisboro. Right now only 800 acres of these greenways are permanently protected. Preserving greenways is recommended by the 1973 and 1985 Lewisboro Master Plans, is highlighted in the recommended changes to the current Master Plan and is endorsed by Westchester County Department of Planning. Biologists also recognize the importance of greenways for preserving wildlife habitat. In addition, these greenways protect the major waterways and wetlands of Lewisboro and include much of the town-wide foot and equestrian trail system.

The **Titicus Greenway**, 50% preserved, is in the northwest corner of town. It is a 450 acre unbroken greenway that extends another 400 acres north into North Salem to the Titicus Reservoir.

The **Mount Holly Greenway**, 60% preserved, is 500 acres of land that ties together ten nature preserves that run from Route 22 all the way to Mountain Lakes Camp.

The South Salem Greenway, 15% preserved, is also 500 acres. It ties together at least ten farms and many old farm fields.

The Mountain Lakes/Kitchawan Greenway is 700 acres, only 10% of which is preserved at this time. It runs from the Three Lakes to Pumping Station Swamp to the Mill River and Lake Kitchawan.

The Silvermine Greenway, 20% preserved, is 500 acres. It runs from the Mill River at Route 35 all the way to the Norwalk Reservoir in the southeast corner of town.

We've reviewed over twenty wildlife studies done in the Town of Lewisboro. Many were done as part of the environmental review process for various subdivisions in town, the rest were done by naturalists at nature preserves and County Parks. All the species listed were either observed or 'probable'. Those considered only 'possible' were omitted. The status of the species is also included. Most of the following species are listed as 'Special concern', 'Threatened', or in some instances, 'Endangered' by NY State DEC or Westchester County. We've also included species considered in "steep decline" in the region by Bedford Audubon Society, and species threatened by habitat fragmentation in the region, according to the Wildlife Conservation Society (see attached letters).

Thirty-four different species of animals and plants that are 'listed' by the County or N.Y.State have been documented as occurring in Lewisboro.

RATING GUIDELINES

Twelve features of each parcel were rated using a zero to three ranking with zero indicating that the feature does not exist or is not significant from a preservation perspective. Ratings of one to three indicate increased relative significance for preservation. Some specific criteria used for the ratings include the following:

Streams:

- 3 for major streams/rivers such as Waccabuc, Silvermine and Mill Rivers and Nash and Brady Brooks, which were identified in the 1973 Town Development Plan.
- 1 or 2 for others based on their relative environmental significance.

Lakes/Ponds:

- 3 for parcels bordering natural glacial lakes such as Oscaleta, Rippawam, Waccabuc and Kitchawan.
- 2 for parcels on other large lakes such as Truesdale, Katonah and Whatmores.
- 1 for man-made, non-functioning ponds.

Wetlands:

- 3 for State designated wetlands of 12.5 acres or more.
- 1 or 2 for others based on relative size and environmental importance
- Ratings based on County maps and site walk.

Aquifers:

3 for parcels located over major aquifers, identified on USGS bedrock maps.

Vistas:

Relative ratings based on contribution to the scenic character of the town.

Ridgelines/Hilltops:

Relative ratings based on topographical maps, site walks and contribution to scenic views.

Steep Slopes:

- 3 for slopes over 25%
- 2 for slopes 20 to 25%
- 1 for slopes 15 to 20%
- Ratings based on County topographical maps delineating steep slopes.

Grasslands/Meadows;

- 3 for more than 50 acres.
- 2 for 10 to 50 acres.
- 1 for 4 to 10 acres.
- Ratings based on aerial maps and site walks.

Trees:

- 3 for very old growth trees such as hemlocks.
- 2 for stands of special or less common species.
- 1 for significant wooded areas of more common species.


Relative ratings based on extent of existing walking and horse trails and those proposed in previous Master Plans.

Connections/Linkages:

- 3 for parcels with multiple connections to open spaces, either preserved or proposed to be preserved, and those with major trail connections.
- 1 or 2 for others based on number and relative importance of linkages to open spaces.

Wildlife Habitat:

- 3 for three habitat types (interior woods, meadows, wetlands) and County "Threatened" or "Endangered" species probable.
- 2 for two habitat types with listed species probable.
- 1 for one habitat type with listed species probable.

Size: 95 acres

Special Characteristics:

Water: Wetland in southwest corner of parcel and at northeast corner.

Steep slopes: Extremely steep slopes, rising 300' vertically to an elevation of 550 feet.

Old Growth Trees: Slopes are covered with old hemlocks.

Stone Walls: High stone walls line old road running from southwest portion of property to northeast corner.

Wildlife: Box turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State, observed in wetland at southwest corner (Klemens, 1999). Also found Spotted Salamander eggs in pool at northern part of wetland. Spotted Salamanders had until recently been listed as "Special Concern" by NY State. The mature hemlocks located on steep slopes may also provide suitable habitat for the Slimy Salamander, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and observed in similar habitat east of here (Chapel Hills 1993) and Lake Oscaleta (Soltesz). This is part of an 800+ acre unfragmented greenway. As such, it supports birds that require interior woods for nesting and breeding such as Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and observed just south of here (MLR Realty, June/Oct. 1991). The steep slopes may also provide suitable habitat for the Worm-Eating Warbler, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and observed east of here (Woods at Waccabuc, 1992), (Waccabuc 1999, Askildsen). The conifer woods may also provide suitable habitat for the Canada Warbler, listed as "Special Concern" by

the County and observed southwest of here (Route 22 Associates, 1992). The large mature trees found here may also provide suitable habitat for the Red-Shouldered Hawk, listed as "Endangered" by the County, and "Special Concern" by NY State, and observed nearby at Rte. 138 and Rte. 22 (Dru Associates, Spring 1993).

Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: High ridgeline runs west/east across property for nearly half a mile.


Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: Parcel is part of 800+ acre greenway extending east to Route 121, north all the way to Titicus Reservoir. It is adjacent to the 118-acre Brownell Preserve, which is adjacent to two parcels totaling 240 acres, one of which is permanently protected by the North Salem Open Land Foundation. Old Growth Trees: Majority of the woods are saplings, perhaps only 30 to 40 year old locust, tulip, black birch, yellow birch, red maple.

Stone Walls: Several throughout.

Wildlife: Wooded wetlands may provide suitable habitat for the Box Turtle, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State, and the Spotted Salamander, recently de-listed. Both Species were observed just south of this parcel, south side of Route 138 (MLR Realty EIS, June 1991).

Birds: Large unbroken deciduous woods provide habitat for interior birds, many in decline because of habitat fragmentation from development, such as the Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, and the Worm-Eating Warbler, listed as "Special Concern" by the County. The large mature trees found here may also provide suitable habitat for the Red-Shouldered Hawk, listed as "Endangered" by the County, and "Special Concern" by NY State, and observed nearby at Route 138 and Route 22 (Dru Associates, Spring 1993)

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: The 84acre parcel in Lewisboro does have existing trails that connect with the 118-acre Brownell


Preserve to the west and the 97-acre North Salem Open Land parcel to the east. This trail system is delineated on the Town Trail map from 1980. This parcel abuts 800 unbroken acres in North Salem, the largest privately-owned undeveloped parcel in Westchester County. Special Characteristics:

Water: Intermittent stream in middle of property running south.

Wetlands: Red maple swamp at north, vernal pool atop ridge east of cliff.

Steep slopes: Very steep slopes from Todd Road at north sloping up to east/west ridgeline, 650' elevation. Large granite boulders on north facing slope. Forty-foot high granite cliffs at ridgeline.

Old Growth Trees: North slope is comprised of 40-year-old sugar maple and ash. Further up slope birch/hemlock, then red oak followed by white oak, which dominates ridgeline. Hemlocks dying in ravine near top. Ridgeline that slopes down to Lake Katonah is filled with black birch, tulip. Red maple dominates wetland at Todd Road elevation.

Stone Walls: Two 4' high stone walls run east/west.

Historic/Archeological Sites: Old farmhouse foundation at Todd Road. Stone walls line old wagon road running south from house.

Wildlife: Parcel has unusual unfragmented 130 acres of hardwood forest. Jay Fain points out that neo-tropical birds require at least 50 acres of unbroken woods to survive. This is type of habitat those birds, which are in decline, need to breed and survive. Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, require such unfragmented woods and have been observed nearby (Route 22 Associates, 1992) (MLR Realty, June 1991), (Yarrow Preserve, J. Fain,

September 1992). Forest west of here (Parker Audubon Preserve) has abundant wildlife. Female Box Turtle, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, observed in June 1999. Wood frogs, large population of grey tree frogs, (both extremely sensitive to habitat fragmentation) observed 6/99 and 12/99 (Soltesz). Property west of Parker contains Box Turtles (listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State), possibly Wood Turtles (listed as "Endangered" by the County, and "Special Concern" by NY State), Spotted Turtles (listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State), and possibly Bog Turtles (Klemens, 7/91), listed as "Endangered" by the County and NY State.

Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: At 650 feet, view to North Salem to north and to Cross River Reservoir to south is stunning.

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: This property is part of the existing greenway corridor that stretches from Route 22 east to Route 121. It is also part of the town-wide trail system. Property connects to Parker Preserve to west, and then to WLT easement at Ferris. Connects to Ramsey Hunt Sanctuary to south and east, which then connects to Mt. Holly and Yarrow/Grierson Preserves to east, which then connect to Frederick P. Rose Preserve, and Long Lake Preserve, which connect through Houlihan to Town Park and Ward Pound Ridge Reservation.





Special Characteristics:

Water: Tributary from Yarrow Preserve to west runs down into Indian River. Beautiful six-foot waterfall with rocky ledges is on west slope Yarrow Preserve. Indian River runs down center of valley to Route 35 and then to Cross River Reservoir, and is listed on the Town's 1973 Open Space Index.

Wetlands: A vast wetland surrounds Indian River. There is a calcareous (marble/limestone) wetland. This soil type is basic (non-acidic) and therefore more hospitable to a variety of unusual plants and animals. Bog Turtles (Listed by County and NY State as "Endangered") have been found here in the past where the canopy is open. Wooded part of wetland is made up of red maple, elm and yellow birch. The wetland also has hummocks, important habitat for amphibians.

Steep slopes: Both sides of Indian Brook are steeply sloped. West side is moist with tributary running down to wetland. East side is drier. Ash, sugar maple, red oak woods is relatively new, fifty years old approximately.

Grasslands: Several large fields are found at top of east ridge with several houses there also. Another, older field is found at end, on west side of Route 121, between "old" Route 121 and current road. Field runs north/south approximately 1/4 mile long. Dogwoods and cedar dominate.

Old Growth Trees: None; relatively young forest east of Indian Brook.

Stone Walls: Stone walls criss-cross the property.

Historic/Archeological Sites: Old Route 121 is a beautiful wide train now. Annie O'Neill's old farmhouse foundation is found on northeast portion of parcel (west side of Route 121). An interesting rusted silo top lies on the ground there.

Wildlife: Bog Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by NY State, have been found here in the past, according to DEC. Box Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, have been observed close by at Yarrow Preserve (J. Fain, Sept. 1992) and at Michelle Estates directly south of here (EIS, Aug. 1985). The NYS wetland across Route 121 had a wide variety of amphibians and reptiles, according to five wildlife studies done there.

Birds: Peregrine falcon has been spotted here, according to local hunters. Fields provide potential habitat for several "listed" species, such as Meadowlark, Bobolink, and Bluebirds, a species that was recently de-listed. "Old Field" habitat by old Route 121 may provide habitat for species in "steep decline" such as Indigo Bunting and Field Sparrow, and for the Golden-winged warbler, listed as "Endangered" by the County, and "Special Concern" by NY State. The unfragmented woods also provide habitat for listed species such as Wood Thrush. Wooded wetlands provide habitat for the Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County and observed west of here at Yarrow Preserve (J. Fain Sept. 1992). Black ducks, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, were observed just south of here (Michelle Estates EIS Aug. 1985). Seven species of warblers "Listed" by the County or NY State have been observed in Lewisboro. Two found along wooded streams, Cerulean and Kentucky warblers, may have suitable habitat in this wetland valley. Thickets found throughout the wetland may provide habitat for the Yellow-Breasted Chat, listed as "Threatened" by the County, and "Special Concern" by NY State. The unfragmented deciduous forests may have provided habitat for the Worm-Eating Warbler, listed as "Special Concern" by the County.

Noteworthy plants/flowers: This is a rather rare calcareous wetland, suitable to a variety of plants that can only exist in such a wetland. An indication of the "basic" soil is the tamarack grove found at the southern end of the Indian Brook valley, just north of Route 35.


Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: Ridge just west of Route 121 affords views looking east.

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: Area has well-marked trails that connect to the west with Yarrow Preserve, which connects with Mt. Holly, Ramsey Hunt and Parker Preserves. Trails connect across Route 121 through Frederick P. Rose Preserve, which connects to Long Lake Preserve. Trails connect to south east through Houlihan, Wilson, Echo Farm, Farvue to Ward Pound Ridge Reservation and to the Town Park. Trails connect to the south through two twenty-acre preserves just north of Route 35. Ward Pound Ridge Reservation can be reached across from Route 35. Special Characteristics:

Water: Perennial stream flows north and west along north edge of parcel, dropping down ravine to NY State wetland east of Route 121, then flowing south into Cross River Reservoir.

Wetlands: NYS Wetland at west edge of property, with red maple, elm, tulip trees dominating. Wetland at northeastern edge of parcel is an open calcareous fen, similar to the calcareous fen across the street east of here (Long Lake Preserve). As a calcareous fen, it provides unusual habitat to a variety of plant and animal species that cannot survive in a typical acidic environment. This is also potentially Bog Turtle habitat (NY State, Westchester County Endangered Species). Another wetland exists just west of the Norway Spruce grove. Ironwood shrubs found here. There are also numerous seeps in the several meadows on eastern portion of parcel that provide valuable habitat to may amphibians, reptiles, and insects.

Steep slopes: Steep slopes form a ravine with stream running through at north-central portion of property.

Grasslands: Six spectacular meadows abut Mead Street. Visible from Mead and Chapel Road, these vistas exemplify the "rural character" of Lewisboro that citizens often cite.

Old Growth Trees: CCC Grove (65 years old) of Norway Spruce separate meadows from large block of unfragmented deciduous trees to west. This is referred to as the "birthing woods," where pregnant cows would seek shade to give birth to their calves when this was a dairy farm.

There are also 100-foot+ white oaks just west of the Norway Spruce grove. Beech trees surround ravine.

Stone Walls: Stone walls line both sides of old horse trail running north/south in center of parcel. Other stone walls lace the property.

Historic/Archeological Sites: north/south stone walls

Wildlife: A healthy population of young adult Wood turtles, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, have been observed in the wetland at west of parcel (Klemens, 1993). Wood turtles are considered extremely rare in Westchester County. Jefferson salamander, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State, and thought to be extinct in Westchester County, were observed in the wetland abutting the northwest portion of this parcel (Christie McDonald, Klemens assistant, June 1999). Jefferson salamanders were observed prior to that just east of Todd Road in wetland just west of this parcel (Chapel Hills EIS, 1990, 1993). These observation show that this unfragmented corridor has some of the rarest amphibians and reptiles in the county. These species, very vulnerable to habitat fragmentation, are able to survive and reproduce in this parcel because it remains unfragmented.

Box Turtles and Spotted Turtles, both listed as "Threatened" by the County, and "Special Concern" by NY State, have also been observed in the parcel adjacent to this (Chapel Hills EIS, 1993), (Woods at Waccabuc EIS, July 1991). Marbled salamanders, listed as "Special Concern" by NY State, and Spotted Salamanders, recently de-listed by NY State, have also been observed in the parcel adjacent to this. The Slimy Salamander, whose range is extremely limited (eastern Westchester County, western Connecticut) has been observed on the adjacent parcel (Hudsonia, 1991). This salamander can only exist in steeply sloped, mature hardwood woods and is listed as "Special Concern" by the County. The Hognose Snake, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and NY State, has been observed on the adjacent parcel (Chapel Hills EIS, 1993), (Woods at Waccabuc EIS, July 1992). Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County, have been observed at the adjacent parcel (see above). Three warblers, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, have been observed on the adjacent parcel, the Prairie Warbler, Worn-Eating Warbler, and Canada Warbler. The sloping deciduous woods on this parcel may provide suitable habitat for the Worm-Eating Warbler. The Norway Spruce grove on this parcel may provide suitable habitat for the Canada Warbler. Cooper's Hawk, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, has been observed at the adjacent parcel (see above). Several other sightings in the area (Farvue Farm), (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation 1985-1999), make it likely that the open woodland of this parcel may provide suitable habitat for this species. The vast open meadows of this parcel, coupled with the large meadow across the street and the fields to the south, provide suitable habitat for may species threatened by the loss of this habitat; Meadowlark and Bobolink, both listed as "Threatened" by the County, Henslow and Savannah sparrows, both listed as "Endangered" by the County, and Field Sparrows and Indigo Buntings, both in "Steep Decline" according to Bedford Audubon. All six of these species that rely on fields for habitat have been observed in the fields a few miles to the south of this parcel (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, 1985-1999) and may find the habitat on this parcel suitable.

Birds: In addition to the many species "Listed" and mentioned above, many other birds are found here. A large flock of bluebirds (recently de-listed as a "Special Concern" species in NY State) joined with Chickadees, Juncos, Nuthatch, and White Throated Sparrows in the wet meadow at northeastern portion of the parcel. Two Great-Horned Owls were flushed from the Spruce grove.

Noteworthy plants/flowers: Calcareous wetlands provide habitat for many unique plants.

Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: See comments above on "grasslands." Ravine in northcentral part of parcel is spectacular.

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: This parcel has well-maintained trails that have been in continuous use for at least 24 years. Several horse jumps remain on the north/south trail west of Norway Spruce. Some stone walls between fields also have wooden jumping fences on top. It is a keystone property because it provides the only connection from the Yarrow Preserve/Mt. Holly Preserve/Indian Brook Valley/Frederick P. Rose Preserve west of here to Long Lake Preserve, Mt. Lakes Camp to east, and to Houlihan/Wilson/Echo Farm train to southeast and Houlihan/Town Park/Ward Pound Ridge Reservation trail to the south. It is also the southeast portion of the "Waccabuc Parcel", a 300+acre parcel that remains unfragmented with the exception of the new subdivision, Rock Shelter Road (Chapel Hills), at northeast corner. The Westchester Land Trust recently received title to approximately 125 acres of this 300+ acre parcel.







Special Characteristics:

Wetlands: Over 50% of this parcel is wetland/wetland buffer. There are two streams that flow through the entire length of this parcel, draining directly into the Cross River Reservoir. The wetlands on this parcel are part of a broader basin that contain species listed as protected by the State of New York as well as species that are found nowhere else in Westchester County. Wood Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, have been observed in this stream basin just west of here (Klemens, 1993), as have Box and Spotted Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State (Chapel Hills 1993, Woods at Waccabuc July 1992). Jefferson Salamanders, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern: by NY State, have also been observed just west of here (Chapel Hills EIS, 1990, 1993). The habitat may also be suitable for Marbled Salamanders, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and found just west of here (see above). Other amphibians that are sensitive to fragmentation such as Wood Frog, Grey Tree Frog, and Spotted Salamander, can also be expected to be found here. Wetland south of Route 35 is calcareous and open, suitable habitat for Bog Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by NY State, but thought extinct in the County. It has suitable habitat for amphibians and reptiles listed above.

Steep slopes: Steep slopes on both sides of streams on southern portion of parcel. Far eastern portion also has steep slopes.

Grasslands: This parcel has five old fields in various stages of succession. Preserving this parcel and linking it with this open space corridor will add to this increasingly rare old field/meadow habitat, sustaining the birds, butterflies reptiles and amphibians that depend on this ecosystem. This parcel now functions as an extension of the Ward Pound Ridge Reservation ecosystem, which is designated an "Important Bird Area" because of its diversity of bird species. The area around and including Ward Pound Ridge Reservation has the greatest concentration of butterflies east of the Mississippi River, according to the North American Butterfly Association.

Old Growth Trees: See below.

Stone Walls: Throughout.

Birds: Bedford Audubon has confirmed through field observation (Askildsen, May 1999) that this parcel has suitable habitat for birds dependent on old field/meadow habitat. Species such as the Meadowlark and Bobolink, both listed as "Threatened" by the County, have been observed just south of this parcel (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation 1985-1999) and may find this habitat suitable. The short grass fields are suitable habitat for the Savannah Sparrow, listed as "Endangered" by the County and observed just south of here (see above). The Henslow Sparrow, also listed as "endangered" by the County, "Threatened" by NY State, and observed just south of here (see above) may also find some of these fields suitable. Field Sparrows and Indigo Buntings are found here, both species are in rapid decline elsewhere due to the loss of old field habitat, according to Bedford Audubon. The north and eastern portions of the property are wooded, generally 40-50 year old hardwood trees, red maple, sugar maple, elm, ash. These unbroken deciduous woods provide habitat for interior birds, many in decline because of habitat fragmentation from development, such as the Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, and the Worm-Eating Warbler, listed as "Special Concern" by the County. Both of these species have been observed here (Askildsen, May 1999) and just south of this parcel (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, 1985-1999). The saplings in the south-west field are the preferred habitat of the Prairie Warble, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, and observed here (Askildsen, May 1999) and just south of the parcel (Ward Pound Ridge 1985-1999). The thickets surrounding the streams and wetlands may provide suitable habitat for the Yellow-Breasted Chat, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State and observed in the western portion of Lewisboro (Route 22 Associates, June 1992), Cerulean Warblers and Kentucky Warblers, birds that prefer streams in deciduous woods and listed as "Threatened" by the County, may find this habitat suitable. Both of these species have also been observed in the western portion of Lewisboro (Route 22 Associates, June 1992). Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County, prefer this wetland habitat and have been observed in several similar locations across Lewisboro (also see Grasslands above).


Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: Hiking and horseback riding trails have been criss-crossing this parcel for as long as the neighbors can remember, and are documented for at least 30 years. Over a mile of trails are found on the parcel. These trails are actively used by neighbors for hiking and by the Lewisboro Horsemen's Association for riding. The parcel provides a vital connection to other pedestrian/equestrian trails. Trail systems in Vista, Bedford, and North Salem can be reached from these trails. This parcel is part of an open space corridor between the County's Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, the Lewisboro Town Park, the Nature Conservancy's Long Pond Reserve and the County's Mountain Lakes Camp.

Special Characteristics:

Water: Intermittent stream at south end flowing south to Route 35.

Wetlands: Large red maple wetland to south and east.

Steep slopes: None, flat meadows and swamps.

Grasslands: Significant fields, five, in various stages of succession. This mosaic of field types is ideal for wildlife. It is also a habitat that, according to Bedford Audubon, is rapidly disappearing. Field to north is four acres, mowed this year, all grass. Field south of it also four acres, mowed this year, with a horse trail circling it. Third field to south is about one acre, mowed this year, grass. These grassy fields are ideal habit for Meadowlark and Bobolink, two species listed by the County as "Threatened" because of the disappearance of this type of field. It's also ideal habitat for the Bluebird, a species that until this year has been listed by NY State DEC as "Special Concern." Two fields to the east are about two acres combined and are "old field" habitat, not cut recently. Blueberry and other shrubs as well as dogwood trees dominate. This "shrub/scrub" habitat is also disappearing, according to Bedford Audubon. It is ideal habitat for Indigo Bunting and Field Sparrows, two species in "steep decline" according to Audubon.

Old Growth Trees: Five impressive 100-foot-tall sugar maples found along three old stone walls at north end (Bouton Road).

Stone Walls: Three old stone walls to north and surrounding fields.

Historic/Archeological Sites: Old saw mill, two old barns at north end by Bouton Road. Connects to Echo Farm, which has been farmed for the last sixty years by Alfred Ridgeway, the last farmer in Lewisboro.

Wildlife: Bobcat, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, have been observed here, according to neighbors.

Birds: See above.

Noteworthy plants/flowers: Wildflowers in all five meadows.


Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: Connects south to Echo Farm by horse trail, and to Waccabuc through Gilbert Farm, all part of the Lewisboro Horsemen's Association Trail System which runs to Goldens Bridge to the west, North Salem to the north, and Vista to the south.

Boundaries:

Wildlife: River Otter, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, has been observed here (Soltesz). Featherfoil, listed as "Threatened" by the County, see just east of this parcel on inlet,

east end of Lake Oscaleta. Spotted Turtle, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, was found just west of here in the Tamarack Swamp (Soltesz). Box Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State, observed just west of here on Oscaleta Road (Ed Wickersham 6/2000). Southern slope of Lake Oscaleta is Slimy Salamander habitat--mature hemlock with duff, rotted logs, and talus slope. Slimy Salamander, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, and found mostly in eastern Westchester Salamander, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, and found mostly in eastern Westchester and western Connecticut, have been observed here ((Klemens "Amphibians and Reptiles of Connecticut.")

Birds: Unfragmented woods south of Lake may provide habitat for Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County. The seven interconnected fields provide habitat for flocks of Bluebirds observed here, recently downgraded from "Special Concern" by NY State. The fields may be extensive enough to provide habitat for Meadowlark and Bobolink, listed as "Threatened" by the County, and the Savannah and Henslow Sparrows, listed as "Endangered" by the County, "Threatened" by NY State. These four species have been observed in the fields a few miles south of here (Ward Pound Ridge 1985-1999). Wetlands on east and west side do provide habitat for Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County and observed on Oscaleta Road, Spring 1999. Red-shouldered hawk, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, observed just west of here (Ed Wickersham 8/2000)


Noteworthy plants/flowers: Angled Spikerush, found across the lake from here, north shore of Lake Oscaleta, rarest plant found in Lewisboro (Soltesz). Tamaracks and orchids are found on south side of Lake Yellow Lady Slipper observed by Ken Soltesz is listed as "Threatened" by the County. Pitcher Plants observed here by Soltesz, listed as "Special Concern" by the County.

Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: Fields are visible and very scenic from Old Oscaleta Road. Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: This parcel provides the connection from Mountain Lakes Camp and Lake Rippowam to the natural vegetative areas along Boway and Pumping Station Swamp (a Bridgeport Hydraulic Company preserve). 



Meadowlark and Bobolink, listed as "Threatened" by the County, and Henslow and Savannah sparrows, listed as "Endangered" by the County, the

Henslow sparrow listed as "Threatened" by NY State, are examples of field-dependent species. Bluebirds, recently downgraded from "Special Concern" by NY State, also rely on fields such as these for nesting. All five of these species have been observed in the fields a few miles south of here (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, 1985-1999). The eastern edge of Lake Rippowam/Lake Oscaleta is also preserved. This parcel connects to trails to the south at Le Chateau, and then to the properties south of Route 35 (Sites #23 and #24). A wide trail runs from the southeast edge along the Connecticut border, but dead ends in the new Church Tavern development. Horse trails at the western edge of Church Tavern have also been bisected by the homes. A possible link may exist along the edge of the three streams that flow north/south through the middle of Church Tavern to Route 35.


This greenway is over the main aquifer in Lewisboro, which stretches from Lake Kitchawan to Pumping Station Swamp into "Three Lakes." Because the aquifer is the source of drinking water for hundred of homes in Lewisboro, it is critical that it be protected from development.



Special Characteristics:

Water: Lake Kitchawan, a 77-acre glacial lake borders southern edge of parcel. Parcel is east of Route 123 abut both sides of Mill River, listed on the Town's Open Space Index of 1973.

Wetlands: Extensive NY State wetlands on western edge of property. One separate 26acre wetland, northeast corner Route 35/121. Both are calcereous limestone/marble and are therefore suitable habitat for sensitive reptiles, amphibians, and plants not found in typical wetlands.

Steep slopes: Magnificent ravine with stone "cliffs" of approximately 25 feet. Ridge line runs north/south entire length of parcel with steep slopes on both sides.

Grasslands: Moderate, around beech grove and old stone ruins.

Old Growth Trees: Southern portion is "old field" consisting of white pine and cedars. This turns to red oak, cedar. Moving north, woods open up more; black cherry, yellow birch and beech dominate.

Stone Walls: Old stone walls dating back to the 19th century; especially spectacular on both sides of carriage road in south/central portion of property.

Historic/Archeological Sites: 19th century carriage trails; Indian artifacts found on property; ruins of 32-room stone mansion (early 1900's), three historical buildings dating from 1700's and 1800's including large carriage house and two smaller colonial style houses. Old barn burned down mid 1990's. Additional house on separated parcel across Route 123 to east. Met a hiker who has lived in the Lake Kitchawan community for 65 years, who recalled the riding stables found here, and the casino just south of here.

Wildlife: As a large, unfragmented wetland, amphibians and reptiles found in many similar locations across Lewisboro would also be expected to be found here. Box Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, Spotted Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, and Marbled Salamander, listed as "Special Concern" by NY State can be expected to be found here. Other amphibians that are sensitive to fragmentation such as Wood Frog, Grey Tree Frog and Spotted Salamander can also be expected to be found here. This unfragmented corridor may also be suitable to Bobcat, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, and observed in Ward Pound Ridge Reservation a few miles west of here.

Birds: American Bald Eagle, Snow Owl, observed here. The interior woods are unfragmented and therefore can be suitable for Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and observed a few miles west of this parcel (Ward Pound Ridge 1985-1999). Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County prefer this wetland habitat and have been observed in several similar locations across Lewisboro.

Noteworthy plants/flowers: Ken Soltesz in his Wildlife Studies, "Rare and Unusual Species in Lewisboro" observed a number of very rare plants and insects in the Lake Kitchawan wetlands. Since this parcel's wetlands abut those of Lake Kitchawan, and are calcereous also, it is likely that these species exist here as well. The New England Bluet damselfly, considered rare globally, has been observed at Lake Kitchawan. Pitcher Plant also observed there. Rare Walking Fern, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and observed in only two other locations in the County, has been observed in the wetland under the Carriage Trail Bridge in the south/central portion of this parcel. A more extensive inventory of plants should be done here.

Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: This high ridge has dramatic views to the west of Ward Pound Ridge hills and the Catskill Mountains west of the Hudson River.

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas:

Property is a major connection in town-wide trail system, connecting Le Chateau trail with Elmwood Road trail to Onatru Farm. To the north, it connects across Route 35 to the Boway Greenway trails and then to Mountain Lakes Camp. It connects to the Lake Kitchawan community to the south, a densely populated community.



Special Characteristics:

Water: Mill River, listed on the Town's Open Space Index of 1973, runs through the

eastern portion of the parcel.

Wetlands: A large wetland surrounds the Mill River, probably created by a former dam downstream. Many cattail clumps are found here, not having been replaced yet by Phragmites, which are found downstream. Cattails provide richer food and habitat than Phragmites. Another wetland is at the northwest portion of the parcel, close to the corner of Route 35 and 123. This is hummocked, with Red Maple predominant, although the center does have an open canopy.

Steep slopes: Land slopes steeply down to the Mill River, a 30-foot drop, at west portion

of parcel.

Grasslands: Many fields, in various stages of succession, occur north and west of the Mill River. Northern most fields at entrance from Route 35 has white pine and grey birch, typical of an old field, growing up around grasslands. Second field to west also has white pine, grey birch, and also white birch, aspen and dogwood. Third field in northwest portion has cedars around tall grass. A Ruffed Grouse was flushed here. A fourth field toward center is mostly grassland.

Old Growth Trees: Several distinct groves of Norway Spruce dating to the 1930's, most likely planted by the CCC, occur across the northwest portion of the parcel. South of Mill River are woods dominated by beech, red oak, and sugar maple. Alders, pussy willows are found at river's edge. Sugar maples are found at northern portion, approximately 40 years old.

Stone Walls: Throughout property.

Historic/Archeological Sites: Indian Shelter on northwest side of Mill River has hundreds of pre-historic hunting tools and pottery, according to neighbor who has excavated there. A complete archaeological study is recommended.

Wildlife: Wood Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, have been observed in this basin a few miles southeast of here (Chance Hills, May 1991). The open, calcereous wet meadow habitat that Bog Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by the County and NY State, require is found in the center of the parcel around the Mill River, and also at the northwestern portion of the parcel where the hummocked red maple wetland canopy opens up. As large, unfragmented wetlands, other amphibians and reptiles found in many similar locations across Lewisboro would also be found here. Spotted Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State, can be expected to be found here. Other amphibians that are sensitive to fragmentation such as Wood Frog, Grey Tree Frog, and Spotted Salamander, can also be expected to be found here. River Otter, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, have been found in the Waccabuc River a few miles west of this parcel and may find the Mill River Greenway suitable as well. Local lore has it that a world record buck, "The Keeler Buck," was taken here many years ago.

Birds: The old field and open marsh habitat attracts tremendous numbers of birds, even in the winter. Red-tail hawks, turkey vultures circled overhead, flocks of chickadees, titmouse, and bluebirds were found across the parcel, several Flickers were also seen. The four fields found here are probably too closed in by succession to support birds such as Meadowlark and Bobolink, or Savannah and Henslow Sparrows. They do, however, support Bluebirds, until recently listed as "Special Concern" by NY State. The "Shrub/Scrub" of the old fields is habitat for birds such as Field Sparrow and Indigo Bunting, two species in "Steep Decline" according to Bedford Audubon. Shrub/Scrub is also suitable habitat for Golden-Winged Warblers, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State and observed in the western portion of Lewisboro (Route 22 Associates, June 1992). The trees surrounding the Mill River may be suitable habitat for Cerulean and Kentucky Warblers, listed as "Endangered" by the County, and observed in the western portion of Lewisboro (Route 22 Associates). Thickets around the Mill River may be suitable for the Yellow-Breasted Chat, also listed as "Threatened" by the County and observed in the western portion of Lewisboro (Route 22 Associates). The conifer stands have habitat suitable for the Canada Warbler, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, and observed a few miles west of this parcel (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, 1985-1999). Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County, prefer this wetland habitat and have been observed in several similar locations across Lewisboro. A Ruffed Grouse, a species in decline according to Bedford Audubon, was observed in one of the fields.

Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: The many open fields are beautiful, as is the broad vista up and down the Mill River.

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: This large parcel can connect southward to the fields on the north side of West Lane. This then connects to a continuous greenway from "Elmwood Estates" south to Onatru Preserve all the way to Lewisboro's southern border at the Norwalk Reservoir. This parcel also connects to Site #23 property, which adjoins it. This greenway also extends north through the LeChateau trails, connecting to Site #21 property, and then through the Boway Corridor all the way to the preserve at the east end of Lake Oscaleta and Lake Rippowam, and then to Mountain Lakes Camp.



Grasslands: Most of this parcel is field, mowed once or twice each summer. Four separate fields total over twenty acres.

Old Growth Trees: Large Sugar Maples along stone walls at field edge. Large Red Oaks and Tulips at woods at northern border. Beech, Black Birch, Yellow Birch and Shagbark Hickory are also found on steep slope. Old apple orchard has forty trees at southern edge.

Stone Walls: Several stone walls divide the fields.

Birds: These large fields are extensive enough to support the many birds that require this habitat to nest. Because fields are being lost to development, and to a lesser extent, succession, these birds are in steep decline. Meadowlark and Bobolink, listed as "Threatened" by the County, and Henslow and Savannah Sparrows, listed as "Endangered" by the County, the Henslow Sparrow listed as "Threatened" by NY State, are examples of field-dependent species. Bluebirds, recently downgraded from "Special Concern" by NY State, also rely on fields such as these for nesting. All five of these species have been observed in the fields a few miles west of

here (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation, 1985-1999). Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County, have been observed nearby on the other side of Route 35 (Sites #14 and #15).

Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: View of these fields is dramatic and visible from West

Lane and the Elmwood Road Special Character District.


Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: Parcel is an important link between the open space (Site #24) to the north, and the many horse farms, wetlands and Onatru Farm to the south. Onatru can be reached through the Site #26 parcel south of Meagher. From Onatru, the Silvermine River and Scott and Norwalk Reservoirs can be reached.

Steep slopes: No, parcel is flat drainage basin.

Grasslands: Horse pastures (and horse farms) surround this parcel to the north and south

Old Growth Trees: Large "wolf" tree, red oak, in center of parcel.

Stone Walls: Old stone walls lace the property.

Historic/Archeological Sites: Old wagon road at south of parcel running east/west has stone walls on both sides.

Wildlife: Wood turtles, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State have been observed in this stream basin a few miles south of this parcel and may be found in this riparian wetland, their preferred habitat. As a large, unfragmented wetland, amphibians and reptiles found in many similar locations across Lewisboro, would be expected to be found here also. Spotted and Box Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County, "Special Concern" by NY State, can be expected to be found here. Marbled Salamander, listed as "Special Concern" by NY State, can also be expected to be found here. Other amphibians that

are sensitive to fragmentation such as Wood Frog, Grey Tree Frog, and Spotted Salamander, can

also be expected to be found here.

Birds: Many winter birds were found here in flocks. Eight Bluebirds, recently downgraded from "Special Concern" by NY State were observed along with Nuthatch. Much of this parcel is young deciduous woods. Birds such as the Prairie Warbler, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, prefer saplings for nesting and may find this habitat suitabale. Also, the Yellow-Breasted Chat, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, prefer thickets in wetlands and may find this habitat suitable. Cerulean Warblers and Kentucky Warblers, birds that prefer streams in deciduous woods and listed as "Threatened" by the County, may be found here. Prairie Warblers have been observed a few miles west of here (Ward Pound Ridge Reservation 1985-1999); the other three warblers have been observed in the western portion of Lewisboro (Route 22 Associates, June 1992). Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County, prefer this wetland habitat and have been observed in several similar locations across Lewisboro.


Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: This large 60+ acre parcel can be connected to Onatru Farm Preserve by a trail easement across the back edge of the property just south of it. This would be a way to expand the Town Preserve. From Onatru, Scott's Reservoir and Norwalk Reservoir can be reached to the south. It may be possible to hike north to the large fields on the north side of West Lane, which would allow hikers to get to Sites #23 and #24 and the Mt. Lakes/Lake Kitchawan greenway.



Wetlands: Wetlands surround both streams. Red maples predominate.

Steep slopes: The parcel slopes sharply down easterly from the center to the stream/wetland on the eastern portion. Mountain Laurel dominates this slope.

Grasslands: None.

Old Growth Trees: No, woods are approximately 40-50-year-old black birch, yellow birch, beech in center, red maple and tulip in lower lying areas around wetlands.

Stone Walls: two north/south stone walls divide parcel at south.

Wildlife: Wood turtles, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, and Box Turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State have been observed in this stream basin just east of here (Chance Hills, May 1991). As a large, unfragmented wetland, other amphibians and reptiles found in many similar locations across Lewisboro would also be expected to be found here. Spotted turtles, listed as "Threatened" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State, and Marbled Salamander, listed as "Special Concern" by NY State, can also be expected to be found here. Other

amphibians that are sensitive to fragmentation such as Wood Frog, Grey Tree Frog, and Spotted Salamander, can also be expected to be found here. Bog Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by NY State, have been found in this stream basin (Chance Hills) according to the DEC; however, the open wet meadow habitat they require does not seem to be present on this parcel.

River Otter, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, have been found in the Waccabuc River a few miles west of this parcel. River Otter are listed as "probable" for the Silvermine River (Chance Hills, May 1991).

Birds: These interior woods are unfragmented and therefore can be suitable for Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County and observed a few miles west of this parcel (Ward Pound Ridge 1985-1999), and on the other side of the Silvermine River (Nordgren, June 2000). The streams surrounded by deciduous woods may also be suitable for Cerulean and Kentucky Warblers, both listed as "Endangered" by the County and observed in the western portion of Lewisboro (Rte. 22 Associates, June 1992). Woodcock, listed as "Threatened" by the County, prefer this wetland habitat and have been observed in several similar locations across Lewisboro.

Noteworthy plants/flowers: Mountain Laurel are found throughout this parcel, as well as throughout the surrounding area of southern Vista. Club Moss are also found in the center of the property along the ridgeline.


Vistas/viewsheds/ridge lines: A ridge runs north/south in center of parcel.

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: This large parcel can be connected to Onatru Farm Preserve to the north by a trail easement through the cul-de-sac that now separates the two parcels. With permission to hike through the Norwalk Water Company's reservoir land, a continuous greenway could be preserved from "Elmwood Estates" north of Onatru Preserve all the way to Lewisboro's southern border at the Norwalk Reservoir. This may also be connected at the northern edge of the Site #23 property by crossing West Lane. This then connects north to Boway and Mountain Lakes Camp. Establishing such a greenway would serve to protect nearly the entire Silvermine River basin's water, as well as providing passive recreation opportunities to citizens and valuable habitat for wildlife.

Special Characteristics:

Water: The Silvermine River, listed on the Town's Open Space Index of 1973, runs through the western portion of the parcel. A stream flows west into Silvermine River. A beautiful waterfall is just south of the Scotts Reservoir dam.

Wetlands: Narrow wetlands exist along Silvermine River.

Steep slopes: Land slopes steeply down west to the Silvermine River.

Grasslands: Approximately twenty acres of fields/horse paddocks on eastern edge.

Old Growth Trees: Most of parcel is heavily wooded.

Stone Walls: Surprisingly absent, suggesting the parcel was never farmed.

Historic/Archeological Sites: Indian arrowheads found on property.

Wildlife: Trout were observed in the Silvermine River. Wood Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by the County and "Special Concern" by NY State have been observed here (Chance Hills, May 1991). According to DEC, Bog Turtles, listed as "Endangered" by both the County and NY State, have been observed nearby (DEC, Sept. 1990)

Birds: Several Wood Thrush, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, were observed. This bird is threatened by fragmentation and requires large blocks of interior woods to survive. The twenty acres of pasture/paddock at the eastern edge of this parcel may be suitable for those birds that require fields for nesting such as Meadowlark and Bobolink, both listed as "Threatened" by the County.

Mammals: River Otter, listed as "Special Concern" by the County, have been found in the Waccabuc River a few miles west of this parcel and are "probable" in the Silvermine River, (Chance Hills, May 1991).

Noteworthy plants/flowers: Dense stands of Mountain Laurel throughout entire property. Naturalists have noted the lack of any non-native invasive plants in this area. A fire in 1999 burned about ten acres of Oak and Mountain Laurel at the north end and will provide an interesting opportunity for sun-loving plants not found here now.

Connections/Corridors/Proximity to other recreational/scenic/important areas: This large parcel connects the Norwalk Water Company preserves, one to the north at Scott's Reservoir, the other at the southern boundary at the Norwalk Reservoir. This parcel is also buffered by the "Silvermine Extension" undeveloped parcel across the Silvermine River.

Many well-maintained hiking trails run throughout the site, both along the north/south ridgeline in the middle of the parcel, and north/south next to the Silvermine River. With permission to hike on the Norwalk Water Company parcels, it will be possible to hike from this parcel north to Onatru Farm and then to the northern end of the Silvermine Greenway at the Mill River and Route 35.
